

At the heart of the summer (on 6th August) is the Feast of the Transfiguration, when we remember Jesus being revealed in glory on the mountain with Moses and Elijah. I pray that in offering Breathing Space and in sharing the Gospel in areas of new housing we might see the glory of God revealed in our midst. I pray also that you may know that glory in restfulness and in work, in summer and throughout the year.

SAFEGUARDING:

PCC MEMBERS and WARDENS WORKSHOP:

Most churches are now effectively a small business being run by trustees who may not realise the extent of their responsibilities. This 2 hour session offers a nuts and bolts introduction to basic governance, and is especially valuable for new PCC members and Wardens. It will include roles and responsibilities, understanding accounts, care of buildings, premises audit, health and safety.

A very helpful session on Parish Finance was given by David Mundy, David Meredith and Jason Kennedy, in June. One participant commented: "The input from JK and DM x 2 was great and it highlighted the wonderful resources that exist to help both 'excited-by-numbers' and 'arm-twisted' volunteers who serve as treasurers etc within our diverse parishes. Of the many diocesan presentations that I have been involved with over a silly number of years, the message 'we are here to help you' came across today as strongly as at any other event. Thank you guys."

IT TRAINING:

This was requested at deanery synod, but we need some more specific information in order to book a suitable training session. E.g. basic internet functions and security? How to use social media effectively? Website design??? Layout for posters and how to write a press release?

FOOD SAFETY TRAINING:

The CIEH Foundation Certificate in Food Safety (also known as Level 2) is designed for anyone working in a food business, to be able to prepare and cook food that is safe for consumption. The course reinforces the importance of food safety and provides learners with an understanding of how to identify and control food safety hazards in their own workplace. It offers the minimum standards for the food safety industry.

We have managed to arrange one training day, for Sat 17th November, at St Stephen's Sinfin (311 Sinfin Lane DE24 9GP). The course will be delivered by a qualified chef/tutor and takes all day (10am–5.30pm) which includes the test and results and certificate. We expect the cost to be c. £30 (based on a minimum number of participants), and some catering will be provided. Please let Jo know asap if you are interested. (jo.simister@derby.anglican.org).

If you need guidance about whether your circumstances require this training, please take a look at https://www.food.gov.uk/business-guidance/hygiene-requirements-for-your-business for definitive advice for people handling food in your parish. NB: The person responsible will need a formal training, see next paragraph.

In the UK, food handlers don't have to hold a food hygiene certificate to prepare or sell food. Many food businesses will prefer that you do."

There is also advice on charity events: https://www.food.gov.uk/safety-hygiene/providing-food-at-community-and-charity-events. This is very helpful and clear about your responsibility to keep, transport and handle cakes and so on safely, for events like summer fêtes and so on.

AND A FINAL WORD: ON LEVIES

Each parish will shortly receive a request for the deanery levy, which was agreed at Deanery Synod as £20 per Deanery Synod Lay Representative allocated for your parish. This levy pays for a number of important functions of the deanery, including part funding this newsletter. I sure you will understand that 123 x £20 (£2460) does not go far and has to be used carefully, and every penny is needed, so we'd be very grateful if your parish could race to be first to pay!

DERBY CITY DEANERY: ROOTED IN PRAYER

Prayer Walking the New Housing Developments: from Revd Andrew Race, Littleover

As part of the emerging vision for mission in the new housing areas, prayer walks have been planned and taken place through some of the significant housing development sites to pray and discern God's purposes before any mission event happens.



These walks have been organised by Derby Deanery and have included ecumenical partners. Walks have taken place in Mickleover, Alvaston and Heatherton. The next is at Sinfin Moor on Tuesday 31st July at 12noon. It is intended that you bring a picnic – this is in the school holidays and families are very welcome.



The walks are gentle and have not been much more than an hour. Some common themes for prayer and community concern have emerged so far:

- Boundary issues between local authorities and across parishes
- Concerns about community infrastructure apart from a few new schools, no new community facilities are being supplied
- Anxiety about community relationships as new communities form alongside existing ones
- Transport infrastructure significantly increased volumes of traffic on already congested roads
- New sites earmarked for schools that these will be places that bring communities together, that the church will have a role in them
- Over the land being built upon, noting the richness and diversity of fauna and flora, wondering about its past use and history – some land has been gifted to the church in the past
- Grief over the loss of land, loss of greenbelt, loss of views, loss of solitude these building sites are very disruptive at the moment
- For protection of builders and site crew as large developments go up very quickly.
- For insight and vision for how church communities come together for mission, and for dialogue with developers about how this could take shape

Thy Kingdom Come: One of Five-a-Day


Dr. Bill Poole, a member of St. Peter's in the City, writes about his experience with Thy Kingdom Come 2018

So there we were in church earlier this merry month of May being encouraged to pray for five people that we know for the period between Ascension and Pentecost. These days the marketing people implore us to eat five portions of vegetable or fruit each day for our physical wellbeing so it didn't seem a bad idea to pray for five people and their spiritual wellbeing.

The week before I started to pray for my group some friends invited me to join them for a few days up near Berwick-on Tweed where they were staying in a holiday cottage for a few days break — "come a stay a night or two" they said. I decided that rather than stay overnight I would just go up for the day, after all it is only a 506 mile round trip and I had a lot on so couldn't afford to stay away.

Ah what it is to be popular! Well please let me know as I am eager to find out! You see the thing is, one of the people on my prayer list was keen to meet up but, as I've already mentioned I had a lot on. You might be amazed to know that I am an expert at dithering and pontificating — oh you aren't? Anyway, I had thought I could combine my visit to the holiday makers and meet up with my prayer friend by taking him with me — but what if..... well maybe not...or then again?

Tuesday 15th May dawned bright and sunny and immediately after breakfast I turned to the Novena 2018 booklet and wondered what it would lead me to think about in terms of praying for my 5 friends. So here it is:



I was struck by the "response with prayer and action" section which starts with the words "Oh God of invitation" - was this an encouragement to invite my friend to join my visit to the holidaymakers? It didn't take too long to establish that everyone was happy to accept this arrangement partly helped I think by a previous similar meeting last year – so we all knew one another at least a

little. The question then arose as to what we might do on the day of the visit. A suggestion came from the holidaymakers "we can take you to Lindisfarne and the Holy Island"!

"You can walk the causeway if you want". I wondered if my prayer friend would think I was trying it on, but soon found out that he was keen to go as he had never been to the area and was interested to visit – come to that I had never been there either so it was a first all round. There followed some research into the history of Holy Island – St Cuthbert and all that – it seemed that my friend knew more about it than me!


After the long and uneventful train journey we were picked up and taken to Holy Island having decided to duck out of the walk over the causeway. I must confess that I wasn't inspired by the island maybe because the warm sun had brought out the crowds and I'm much more content with quiet places where I can sense creation.



Walking along the shore in the warm sunshine near Banburgh Castle felt more like my kind of thing and comments from my prayer friend had much the same feeling. I wonder what it must have been like for the disciples meeting Jesus on the shore after His resurrection. They had lost all sense of purpose when Jesus was crucified and they had returned to fishing as they had been doing when he first called them to follow him. The trouble was they caught nothing all night so even what they knew had failed but all was about to change.

Jesus advises them to cast their net on the other side of the boat and they have a huge catch. When the disciples get back to the shore they find that Jesus had already cooked fish and had bread – some 5-a-day for them – here was restoration of all that they thought they had lost and much more – a new life of mission.

In praying for 5 people we were taking part in mission and offering an invitation might be all we are asked to do. I don't know what impact the visit to Holy Island has had on my friend and it might seem like a failure to me but if God is providing the 5-a-day who knows!

Host Derby

Do you have a spare room and could you open your heart and your home to someone seeking sanctuary?

Host Derby aims to provide temporary accommodation with volunteer hosts in their own homes offering a lifeline for vulnerable asylum seekers and refugees. This could be anything from a few days to a few weeks, whatever the Host is comfortable with.

Those seeking asylum in the UK have experienced untold horrors in their home countries, fled their homes and travelled with great difficulty across the world to find safety here. Yet they may find their claims for asylum rejected and are then left homeless, penniless and without the right to work or support themselves in the UK.



Why do Hosts do it?

In one of our Host's own words, here's why:

"Having enough to eat and somewhere safe to live are absolute fundamentals, that we have but some of those now living among us simply do not........Every year we celebrate the birth of a Middle Eastern Jewish baby, whose parents had to flee Herod's murderous regime and become refugees in a strange land - which accepted them. Every year we read of Christ on the cross instructing his friend to care for his now unsupported mother in his own home. The boy with only five loaves and two small fishes shared all that he had. The Samaritan saw someone in dire need, and took care of him, regardless of creed or colour, nevertheless continuing with his own life. We are told that 'inasmuch as ye do it for the least of these my people, ye do it unto me.' We say in every Communion service, 'All things come from you, and of your own do we give you.' We ourselves had been given much, so it was reasonable that much was required of us. So, as 'empty-nesters', we currently have an otherwise destitute, very charming and delightful asylum seeker using the spare space in our home"



As a Host you will be offered ongoing support and training from the Host Derby Coordinator and only 'guests' known to our partners at the Red Cross and Refugee Advice Centre are eligible for the scheme. These partners will then support the 'guest' to access the right help and re-engage with the asylum system and move on with their lives.

What difference can you make?

"When I had nowhere to go and no one to help me; they gave me somewhere to live and food to eat....they are very good people"

"I stayed with a really nice and good family. They helped me so much, I didn't know people could be so kind"

What is a vocation?



Breathing Space

Breathing Space is an initiative of Derby City Churches to promote mental wellbeing. It focuses on the positive contributions that can be made to support the mental health of everyone, and not just those who have a particular diagnosis.

According to work by the New Economics Foundation on behalf of Foresight (The Government Office for Science), there are five factors that contribute to mental wellbeing. They are known as the Five Ways to Wellbeing: Connect; Be active; Take notice; Keep learning; Give. Each Breathing Space will support at least one of these factors.

To be eligible for designation as a Breathing Space, an activity must meet the criteria:

- 1. It supports at least one of the Five Ways to Wellbeing;
- 2. It is open to anybody (for schools, this means anyone within the school);
- 3. It is part of a church or school that is intentionally developing a culture that is aiming to promote positive approaches to Mental Health; and
- 4. It offers signposts to other areas of Mental Health support.

To be designated as a Breathing Space requires the following from the Church Council or School Governing Body:

- A resolution, asking for the designation and affirming the criteria are met;
- A commitment to learning about Mental Health; and
- Sharing in the Breathing Spaces network (a named contact for sharing and receiving information, and sending representatives to an annual gathering).

Turn your church green



The garden provides a quiet space with benches for those around who may want to eat their lunch away from the office.

When Jo asked me to bulk out the paper that I had presented to the Clergy Chapter for this newsletter, I thought the best way to let you get to know who we are and what we do would be to give you a snap-shot of our life together during the past 6 months.

St John's could be described as being an inclusive modern catholic church which enjoys traditional choral worship. We are very fortunate to have an excellent organist and a very good traditional choir and it's here with the choir that we began the year.

With Maurice Walkerdine, a Bishop's Badge holder, we celebrated his retirement after 75 years as **a choir** member in this church. Having been brought into church as an infant for baptism and starting his choir life at the age of 7, Maurice was only ever missing from the choir for sickness and his holiday! A remarkable achievement.

Sadly we do not have many children at St John's but we are working on it and seeing some signs of growth through the recent introduction of Messy Church. The first of our 4 afternoons during the year



was Epiphany with activities including making Christingles and a short Christingle service with procession to the crib where all the children sang Away in a Manger in the candlelight. Awww! This was followed by a tea party with a traditional Epiphany cake complete with a baby Jesus hidden in the lucky slice.

As many of you will be aware we are surrounded by student accommodation and we try our best to make new students welcome and make St John's available to them. Being open Tues-Thurs during

the week between 4.30pm and 6pm, we sometimes find students taking time out for quiet reflection and prayer or coming in to light a candle for a sick relative back home.

When term starts our bakers provide delicious cakes for the welcome teas hosted by the Chaplaincy team from the University. In January we also enjoyed hosting an evening for the newly arrived overseas students who came together to meet one another and play some games — including table tennis in the nave! The evening concluded with the students enjoying a traditional fish and chip supper.

We at St John's are committed to renewing and deepening our faith through study and the experience of a varied liturgy. This year we held our usual Lent Groups holding one meeting in the afternoon and the other in the evening. The children experienced Holy Week at the 2nd of our Messy Church

afternoons where they took part in activities connected with all the events of Holy Week including a Palm Sunday procession with a wonderful 'marching band' provided by the children!!

We enjoyed a full Holy Week with services every day: — a Passover supper where the children played an important liturgical roll of finding the hidden bread! This was followed by the more formal service for Maundy Thursday including Foot-washing, procession to garden (in the Lady Chapel) and a Watch. On Good Friday there was an informal service for families in the morning and the formal Good Friday Liturgy with sung Reproaches and Veneration of the cross. All this culminated in the new fire of Easter, procession and blessing of the Easter Garden.

One of the highlights of the year was taking a party of 23 people of varying ages on a weeks' pilgrimage to the Isle of Iona – returning saying things like – 'that was amazing, I feel so much closer to God'. Or, 'my whole life has been transformed – it all makes much more sense now'!!

Here is Claire's account of her experience:

This was my second visit to Iona and I didn't hesitate in signing up again.....in one of the guidebooks I read at my first visit, someone wrote that everyone that visits Iona returns at least twice... and I understand now why. Visiting this beautiful island... whatever the season... helps me look at my commitment to my faith..its time away



from daily life..which in my case can be a little crazy fitting it all in. People these days live life at such a fast pace...But in Iona it all seems different... time spent either alone or with others gave me a chance to look more at why I am a Christian. A simple thing like just sitting alone with a cuppa looking out to sea thinking about a meditation I had just taken part in means so much more as I had time to think. Whilst Iona is a peaceful place it seems to give me new energy to come back to reality ready to take on life again. Iona is also a place where great friendships begin or are renewed.

We returned from Iona to host the Derby Arts Festival — a full 3 weeks of musical competition for young people which culminated in a Gala concert where the Kanneh Mason Trio — the young man who played for the royal wedding and his family — played to a packed church of over 400 people.



Throughout the year we hold several fundraising events that are open to the parish – the last one being the Sausage Sizzle at which we raised money for 2 local charities that provide working dogs. Last year we were able to present a cheque for £900.00 to Derby Kids Camp who were able to

send someone to talk about their last camp and what they offer the children that they take away.

The 'Thy Kingdom Come' Pentecost initiative began with a Big Brekkie before the Sunday morning service where we raised over £150.00 for Christian Aid and ended with a great release of Pentecost Balloons – biodegradable of course!



Our current project is reaching out to the businesses in the parish – so we've had a number of people spending time visiting all the offices, taking posters and flyers which invite people to use our garden to have their lunch – a rare green space in the parish. We are also offering some short lunchtime talks and a concert during the next 3 months as well as a confidential listening ear should it be needed.

The next thing on our agenda is our church camping weekend where all our young families are camping in a field near Matlock and others will be joining us for the Saturday afternoon and evening barbeque. On the Sunday we shall enjoy an outdoor Eucharist – weather permitting! We look forward to the children providing that 'musical accompaniment' again!

But our biggest event that weekend will be enjoying the privilege of partnering with the Methodist Church when we host one of their national ordination services here and 700 people will be packed into the church.



We would like to extend a warm welcome to all Christians across the city who find quiet reflection and the use of chants and silence to be helpful in their spiritual walk.


The hour is candlelit and always includes a ten-minute period of silence and the opportunity to light votive candles during a time of intercession.
