News from Derbyshire Refugee Solidarity

Many churches in the deanery have been collecting clothes for children's winter packs to go to Lebanon following information from Reverend Cath Hollywell about the work of Derbyshire Refugee Solidarity and a talk about her trip to the Calais 'jungle'

Here is the latest news from the campaign:-

'Our children's winter clothing packs campaign had a HUGE response. With the help of Muslims In Need and other groups across the East Midlands, over 3000 winter clothing packs, along with food, duvets, blankets and clothes are on their way to Syria.

The response has been enormous. So many kind people have made up packs at home, collected at their local schools and churches, held packing parties, trawled through charity shops for coats, gloves and hats and spent hours in a freezing cold warehouse sorting clothes into ages and then making more packs up. It's been incredible.

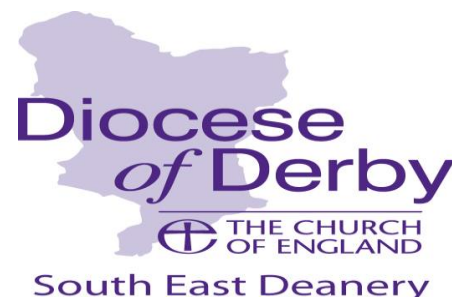
The aid we've collected as part of this project was intended for Lebanon, where many Syrians are currently living as refugees, having escaped the conflict in their home towns. So, it is with a very heavy heart that we had to announce that it's become almost impossible to get containers into Lebanon, and a nationwide decision has been made to redirect all planned containers to other places. As a result, we have taken the decision to send all of the children's winter clothes packs to Syria. There are many children there in great need, and the winter is harsh, so we can all be sure that the effort we have gone to to make these packs has not been wasted and in early January we finally filled up and waved goodbye to a 40ft container of aid, now on its way to Syria.

PACKS FOR PARIS

DRS's next big project is to collect and provide vital aid for the refugees living in and around Paris. This situation is very different there to that of the camps. Despite the awful conditions in the camps, there was at least access to hot meals and places people could go to collect donated clothes, shoes and toiletries. There were communal areas they could use and tents or shelters where they could at least have some privacy and shelter from the elements. Now that The Jungle has been demolished, many refugees have nowhere to go and are congregating on the streets in and around Paris.

In order to best serve these people, we need to change our strategy. It is no good delivering tents when they have nowhere to pitch them. It is no good delivering rice and oil, when they have no place to cook or utensils to cook with. So, we have come up with the idea of putting together useful packs that can be easily distributed, that contain essential items to meet some of the refugees' most basic needs - food, warmth and hygiene. So we are asking all our members and supporters to help us with our Packs for Paris project.

If you want to help, please either make up packs as per the contents opposite, or bring to our warehouse the individual items so we can make them up. Thank you

Training within the Deanery

New Safeguarding Training

Different safeguarding training courses are available and different roles will require different levels of training. C0: Basic Safeguarding Awareness Everyone needs to complete this training. There will be a Church of England designed online course available soon which you will be able to access through the Diocesan website. We will run a few face to face courses for those who do not have access to a computer. This must be completed every 3 years.

C1: Safeguarding in a Church Context-for those who work with children or adults or have responsibility for those undertaking those roles. This must be completed every 3 years.

C2: Safeguarding for Leaders- for those in any position of leadership. This must be completed every 5 years.

C3: Safeguarding for Oversight. This is for priests in charge, licensed and authorised ministers. This must be completed every 5 years.

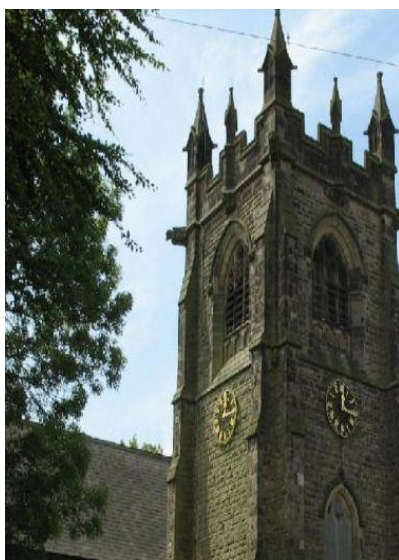
Suspicious circumstances at churches/ symbols left to identify targets

It has come to the Diocese attention that members of the criminal fraternity may be leaving markers at churches where existing roof alarm systems have been attacked so accomplices can return at a later date to remove lead / copper sheet.

An alarm engineer responding to a call out pointed out that where sensors had been smashed he had found stones left resting on the top of a stick, he removed these and on returning again, they had been replaced. They were directly under the roof where the sensors had been damaged or ripped off and lead was present.

Where roof alarms are installed any activations or problems should be treated as serious and immediately addressed. Ecclesiastical recommend:

- Contact the alarm company and check the system
- Contact the police and tip them off about any possibly suspicious alarm activations, even when no obvious attacks have been made on the roof (yet!)
- Share with other churches / properties in the area.

Do come along – Breaston choir will be joined by others to help celebrate the light of Christ amidst the darkness of Winter

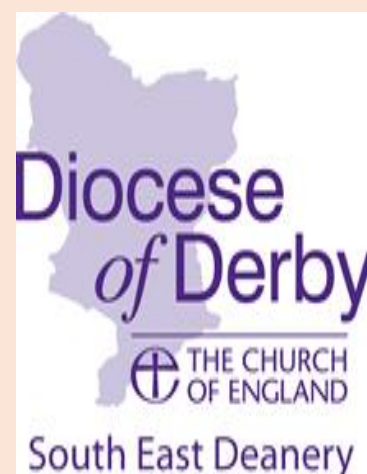


Deanery Synod – Christ Church Cotmanhay and Shipley

Responding to Modern Slavery Course

A short course to introduce the issues, and to explore the possibilities of being part of a committed response.

Venue: St Peter's Derby

Programme

1. Modern Slavery – making a response
2. The Importance of Partnership
3. Prayer, Practice and Commitment
4. Organising and Enabling

6. A Religious Community: faith framed for sustainable commitment

As you know, Derby Diocese has been leading the way with anti-slavery work nationally. In addition to the practical modern slavery and victim support work in the Diocese I have been keen to establish an Order of Life to ground our work spiritually. Having reflected on this I have designed a course due to take place during January and February to equip volunteers to learn about slavery and contribute time to victim support; but also with the intention of setting up 'hubs' with a commitment to regular prayer.

The aim of the course is to create a discussion and offer an invitation to make a commitment in a variety of capacities using our gifts and vocation.

In each session I wish to raise awareness, offer signposts for responses by both individuals and faith communities to which they might be connected. There will be a variety of guest speakers from both the diocese and also the Derby and Derbyshire Modern Slavery Partnership.

The final session will test out the viability of establishing some kind of framework for faith commitment to offer support, connection, and prayer. Such a coalition of commitment could, of course, offer resource to our response to other pressing social issues too.

The long stretch of the liturgical year between Pentecost and All Saints Day can be a challenge for preachers. During this training day Canon Rosalind Brown will draw on her experience of writing regular columns on the Sunday readings for the Church Times and her book "Can Words Express Our Wonder? Preaching in the Church Today" to offer inspiration and ideas. The focus will be on Matthew, the liturgical gospel for the year.

The Revd Rosalind Brown is Residentiary Canon and Canon Librarian of Durham Cathedral, having previously trained people for ordination in Salisbury. She studied at London University and Yale Divinity School, worked for many years as a town planner before spending some years in the United States, where she was in parish ministry and a member of a Benedictine religious community.

She is the author of a number of hymns and books including: Being a Deacon Today (2005), Being a Priest Today (2002, 2006) written jointly with Christopher Cocksworth, and all published by Canterbury Press, and Durham Sings! (2009) and Ramsey Remembered: The Durham Years (2010), published by Durham Cathedral

Experience Easter for Older People

Many churches in the Deanery run 'Experience Easter' or similar interactive sessions for children in schools during Lent. But here are some ideas from the Diocese of Gloucester that may help to expand this mission to older people in church groups or homes for older people

This pack contains a series of ideas for talks and activities with those in residential care homes. It may be that you only make one visit during the season of Lent and Easter, or you may choose to offer a morning with more than one story or activity. You will need to acquire a very special box to use as the treasure box. Inside it you will need to have a special cloth: you may like to change the colour of the cloth from purple to gold depending on the appropriate liturgical colour at the time of your visit.

The box also needs to be large enough to contain one or more of the items at the heart of each programme – the largest item is some home baked bread and a small water spray.

Starting a session

It is helpful to have some clear indicator that the time is moving from a more informal chat towards a more purposeful input. This might be lighting a candle and using a simple response such as: "The Lord be with you".

"And also with you."

Begin by placing the box in a visible place, such as a table.

Open it respectfully and then take out the cloth, placing it on the table, with the open box nearby.

Say: This is the place for the treasure of memory. This is the place for the treasure of Easter.

It may be appropriate to have enough items to give or hand round to each member of the group.

These might be in the box or kept separately.

One item might be left behind for display in a suitable place, depending on the layout and needs of the residential home.

Each session is based around talk and reminiscence and involves telling a simple story, with an optional craft activity. It is important to give plenty of time to talk. The materials could also be used with other groups of people e.g in day centres or lunch clubs

- Session 5: Stewardship of the Earth's Resources

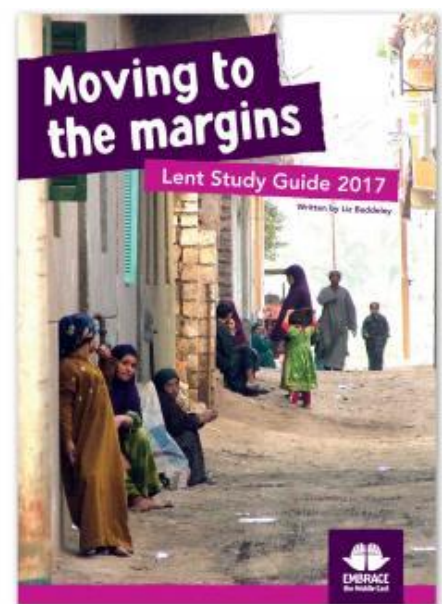
