

## Statistics for Mission—Deadline End January 2024

I know, I know...Collecting statistics is one more job...

However, it is a job which plays a vital role in understanding not only what's going on in our individual churches, but also in our diocese and on a national scale. The more we are faithful in submitting data the more it's possible for mission decisions which affect us strategically and financially to be made faithfully and wisely. The life of our diocese and deanery is directly impacted by the figures we provide.



Statistics for Mission data are required to be submitted by <u>end of January 2024,</u> and it's not too early to make a start on them. There should be a designated person in your church for submitting these. (Statistics for Mission figures are often submitted by the Incumbent, Warden or Parish Secretary). # Deanery Leadership Team:- Who, What, Why, Where?



I'm <u>Sue Cavill</u> and I'm a member of All Saints and St Mary's, Sawley. My husband and I have lived in Sawley for eight years since moving from Leicester.

I'm one of the musicians at church and my husband (who is a lay reader) and I lead a house group. I have also been very involved in projects to help the church become a silver eco-church. My background is in communications and although I am now retired from full-time work I still freelance advising public sector organisations about public consultations.

In 2021 I stood for General Synod on a platform of care for the environment, a belief in the parish system as a basis for our mission, a desire for lay people to be valued and developed, and for the church hierarchy to communicate better with those at parish level. I was elected to serve a five year term. As a member of the Dean-

ery Leadership Team I try to communicate what's been happening at General Synod and how it may have an impact at parish level, and to listen to people's concerns to help me when making voting decisions.

What I appreciate about our deanery is the opportunity to meet people from so many churches and to hear so many exciting stories of God at work. My hope for the deanery as we move into 2024 is that we can support each other and work together more and more to bring the good news of our Saviour to the people of South East Derbyshire.



I'm <u>Rachel Hobbs</u>, and I spent all my working life in nursing. After marrying John, we moved to Risley in 1999. I have been a committed Christian since my early 20's, and was licensed as a Reader in 2007. I love gardening and after retiring in 2011 I began as a volunteer gardener at Treetops Hospice in Risley. John and I share a love of walking and our 4 year old border terrier, Milly, ensures this is part of our daily routine.

As a Licensed Lay Reader I am involved with Sunday services primarily in Risley, and am passionate about pastoral care which involves visiting a number of elderly folk in Risley and supporting a monthly benefice Tea and Company afternoon in Dale Abbey.

For some years I have been our Deanery sub warden of Readers and since July 2022 have been Sub warden of Readers for our Archdeaconry. This sub warden role involves keeping a pastoral eye on other readers, and being part of the Deanery (and Archdeaconry) Leadership team.

We are so fortunate that we have some extremely dedicated and hard working Readers in our parishes in this deanery, and my hope and prayer for 2024 is that we can encourage more people to prayerfully consider and explore training to be a licensed Reader. we can all deepen a sense of mutual belonging across the Deanery and so support and strengthen one other in ministry.







Every One Eats is an amazing example of what churches can do, linking with local charities and agencies.

This charity was set up by Rev'd Christine French at Kirk Hallam with neighbour Lindsey Rice, building on experience from the Ilkeston Winter Shelter. On Christmas Day this year the Every One Eats volunteers took out 200+ free Christmas Dinners, with pudding and treat bags too, expanding from the 175 meals delivered last year.

The Everyone Eats food bank (which takes food to people's front doorstep at an agreed time) has taken out over 600 food parcels in the Ilkeston area from 1<sup>st</sup> January to 31<sup>st</sup> October 2023. That breaks down to 776 adults, 509 children, 43 dogs and 16 cats.

Because of the increase in new requests for help, the Trustees decided that those who had been having food parcels twice a month for more than 3 months, could only have one parcel a month, reflecting that this provision is to support people at times of crisis in their lives.

# Thinking About Lent

#### ...but we've only just stopped thinking about Christmas!! Is it that time of year already?

#### With Ash Wednesday as early as 14th February this year, the answer is...yes!

Although many organisations have yet to make available their 2024 Lent offerings, here are a few possibilities to consider for Lent study or reading, either for yourself or for a church group.



The Church of England—Watch and Pray: Wisdom and Hope for Lent and Life. On the night he was betrayed, Jesus kneels in darkness in the Garden of Gethsemane. Though he pleads with his disciples, "Stay here with me ... Watch and pray," they all fall asleep, leaving him alone in his hour of deepest suffering.

This Lent all of us are encouraged to draw on the wisdom of Black Spirituality, particularly the practice of "tarrying" (waiting) as a community to draw closer to

Jesus and to each other. This year's resources have been inspired and informed by the 2024 Archbishop of Canterbury's Lent book, <u>Tarry Awhile: Wisdom from Black Spirituality for people of faith by Selina</u> <u>Stone</u> (SPCK). The daily reflections booklet (CHP) exploring the same themes has been written by Carlton Turner.



**Diocese of Derby—Amazing Grace.** This course jointly developed with the Diocese of Coventry was introduced for Lent 2023. Its main subject is understanding the problem of racism, those who experience it, the privilege of those who do not and its impact upon the church's mission and ministry. There are downloadable resources for each week, which include prayer, lectio divina and

a biblical reflection. Sessions are designed to last from between 75 and 90 minutes. It was well received last year and continues to be a valuable resource both for Lent study and at other times. Find out more at <u>Amazing GRACE</u> (<u>amazing-grace.co.uk</u>)



<u>The Clewer Initiative</u>—Over the last six months The Clewer Initiative has worked closely with the <u>World Council of Churches</u> to create an international Lent Resource for 2024, entitled True Freedom. <u>https://www.truefreedom24.com/</u>

True Freedom is a six week course, drawing on themes from the book of Galatians, and designed to encourage individuals and churches to respond to modern slavery in their communities.




<u>Christian Aid—Act on Poverty</u> Christian Aid, along with partner organisations, has produced for 2024 a series of six resource packs for small groups, aimed at enabling churches and individuals to gain a deeper understanding of the experiences of poverty both local and global, and to offer inspiration for actions big and small which can make a difference. The packs contain bible studies, audio and video recordings, questions for discussion, and a guide for churches to advocate for change. More information and

# Thinking About Lent



London Institute for Contemporary Christianity—Fruitfulness on the Frontline. This six-week programme explores six expressions of fruitfulness, using a resource book for individual reading, or videos and a discussion guide suitable for group use. Themes are: Modelling Godly Character; Making Good Work; Ministering Grace and Love; Moulding Culture; Mouthpiece for Truth and Justice; Messenger of the Gospel. **Diocese of Gloucester—Shapes for Living.** This 5-week Lent course invites participants into a pattern of life and discipleship which is sustaining and provides space to flourish. Mindful of the many pressures of modern living, and taking as its starting point the words of Jesus: 'I have come that they may have life, and have it to the full' (John 10:10), the course is organised under five headings: Relating; Praying; Working; Playing; Growing. <u>Life on the Breadline</u> Drawing from findings from a three–year research project on urban poverty, Life on the Breadline's Lent Course promises a 6 week course using prayer, video, scripture, guided reflection and practical action. It covers themes including Christian responses to poverty, race, ethnicity, austerity and faith, deficits and assets, housing inequality and structural inequality.
